RIGIN, MIGRATION AND SETTLEMENT OF THE MANYU PEOPLE.

The indigenous population of the Manyu Division who today constitute the tribes like the Banyang, Keakaas, Anyangs and Bokis all originated eastward from Ekoi in South Eastern Nigeria. The real factors responsible for their movements remain clouded because it is based on speculation. However, Ejagham and Banyang oral traditions hold that inter-tribal wars, the escape from slave raiders and the desire by some Efik fishermen to do fishing at the Manyu River were the three fundamental factors responsible for the people's migration.

In their Southward movement from Nigeria, the people were led by a hunter, Akwen who took them through the forests, crossing rivers and streams, and trekking upon hills and valleys. They subsequently arrived the Ekok border and eventually settled at the forested area today known as Eyumojock from where internal dissension led to a split within the group. This was because the leader of the group Akwen, began raiding some of his able men and sold them out of the group as slaves, to Nigerian slave traders who wandered across the length and breath of the border in search for escaped slaves.

Those who separated from Akwen's group later settled elsewhere and opened up new sites for their settlement. It is believed that the villages of Kembong, Ndepaya and Mbakem came into existence because of the separation and majority of the Ejagham speakers traced their origin from this historic movement.

Trafficked child recovered

A missing child, Ndoh Bidai Daniel, kidnapped on 15 November 2016 has been found.

The five year old was abducted in Maroua by Salamatou Djibrila 24 years. According to Gendarmerie sources, the captor, ironically a mother of a 3 year old boy, used candy to lure Ndoh Bidai Daniel at a time he was playing with siblings.

The child was taken from Garoua to Nigeria as part of a



trafficking scheme that is recurrent within the Northern Regions of Cameroon. The parents of the child immediately alerted the forces of law and order and the search for the little boy intensified.

Salamatou Djibrila had financial motivations and planned on selling the child for a yet to be disclosed sum of money.

In Nigeria, the child trafficker, for the deal to mature, unfortunately, got discovered by the aunt of her victim.

The Nigerian security forces were alerted and the little boy was quickly recaptured from the hands of Salamatou. They were all conveyed to the Gendarmerie in Garoua where Salamatou unremorsefully detailed her intentions.

The security officials in the Region, on the occasion of this happy end to such a sad story, called on the population to be vigilant and intensify the fight against child trafficking.

BOMBARDIER CHAIRMAN WANTS HIS PAY BROUGHT BACK TO 2015 LEVELS

A public uproar over a hefty increase in compensation to senior executives at Bombardier prompted the company's chairman to ask his board of directors late Friday to scale back his pay to 2015 levels.

Total compensation for the Montreal-based manufacturer's top five executives and Beaudoin was

US\$32.6 million in 2016, up from US\$21.9 million the year before.



The Quebec government gave Bombardier (TSX:BBD.B) roughly US\$1 billion in 2016 while the federal government recently announced a \$372.5-million loan package for the firm's CSeries and Global 7000 aircraft programs.

CAMEROON COACH HUGO BROOS WELCOMES FECAFOOT INQUIRY

Coach Hugo Broos has told BBC Sport he welcomes an inquiry by the Cameroon Football Federation (Fecafoot) into the administrative problems suffered by the African champions.

The latest issue was when the team were denied lunch at a hotel on Tuesday due to an unpaid bill.

Later that day Cameroon lost 2-1 in a friendly to Guinea after which he said he was considering his future.

"I'm happy with the reaction because they realised what happened," he said.

"If they want an inquiry, it means they know there were mistakes and maybe in future those mistakes won't happen again."

The 64-year-old Belgian conceded that his reaction may have been a 'little bit too heavy' but that there was a good reason for his approach. "I hope that things will change after my comments — this is the most important thing," said Broos, who won the Africa Cup of Nations last month in spite of having worked on the continent for just a year.

"In a few months, there is the Confederations Cup and we are playing against the best teams in the world (Germany, Chile, Australia) so everyone has to be awake again."

His words have already had a reaction with Fecafoot opening an inquiry into the matter on Tuesday, while also the stating that circumstances which prompted Broos' public complaints were 'unacceptable.'

JOB NEWS

Job Vacancy and Wage Survey, third quarter 2016

Canadian employers had 402,000 job vacancies in the third quarter, and the national job vacancy rate was 2.5%.

Both the overall number of job vacancies and the job vacancy rate in the third quarter were little changed compared with the third quarter of 2015. However, there were notable changes among the provinces and territories

Compared with the second quarter of 2016, the number of job vacancies (seasonally unadjusted) increased by 2.4% in Canada, while the job vacancy rate was unchanged. The job vacancy rate refers to the share of jobs that are unfilled out of all payroll jobs available. It represents the number of job vacancies expressed as a percentage of labour demand, that is, the sum of all occupied and vacant jobs.
